

with the theme of the Symposium. It should ideally involve thinking 'outside the box' - differently, unconventionally and from a new perspective – and be thought-provoking.

It is not intended as a presentation about one single project or achievement.

Keynote presentations should be accompanied by a corresponding, supporting paper that will be published as part of the Symposium's proceedings.

Paper with oral presentation

A paper with oral presentation is typically well suited to communications that either:

- review and analyze a particular technique or problem and possible solutions; or
- provide insights into a particular project and lessons learned from it.

Each paper needs to include at the front an abstract highlighting the key aspects of the paper, including conclusions and outcomes thought to be applicable and of benefit to other National Antarctic Programs. The abstract should ideally be self-contained on one single page.

Format instructions:

Ten pages maximum. A4 Page. Fonts: Arial, 11 ppt. 1,5 line-spacing

Poster

A poster presentation is usually best suited to a descriptive or very focused communication. It can for example be very effective in communicating how a particular installation, construction, logistic supply chain or business process is designed and operated - taking advantage of the large format, visual nature of posters where diagrams, schematics or flow charts can combine with short explanatory text to give a clear picture of how things work.

Each poster needs to be accompanied by a one page abstract highlighting the key aspects of the paper, including conclusions and outcomes thought to be applicable and of benefit to other National Antarctic Programs.

It is the responsibility of each poster author to bring to the Symposium a paper copy of the poster for display, and paper copies of their abstract for distribution during the poster session.
